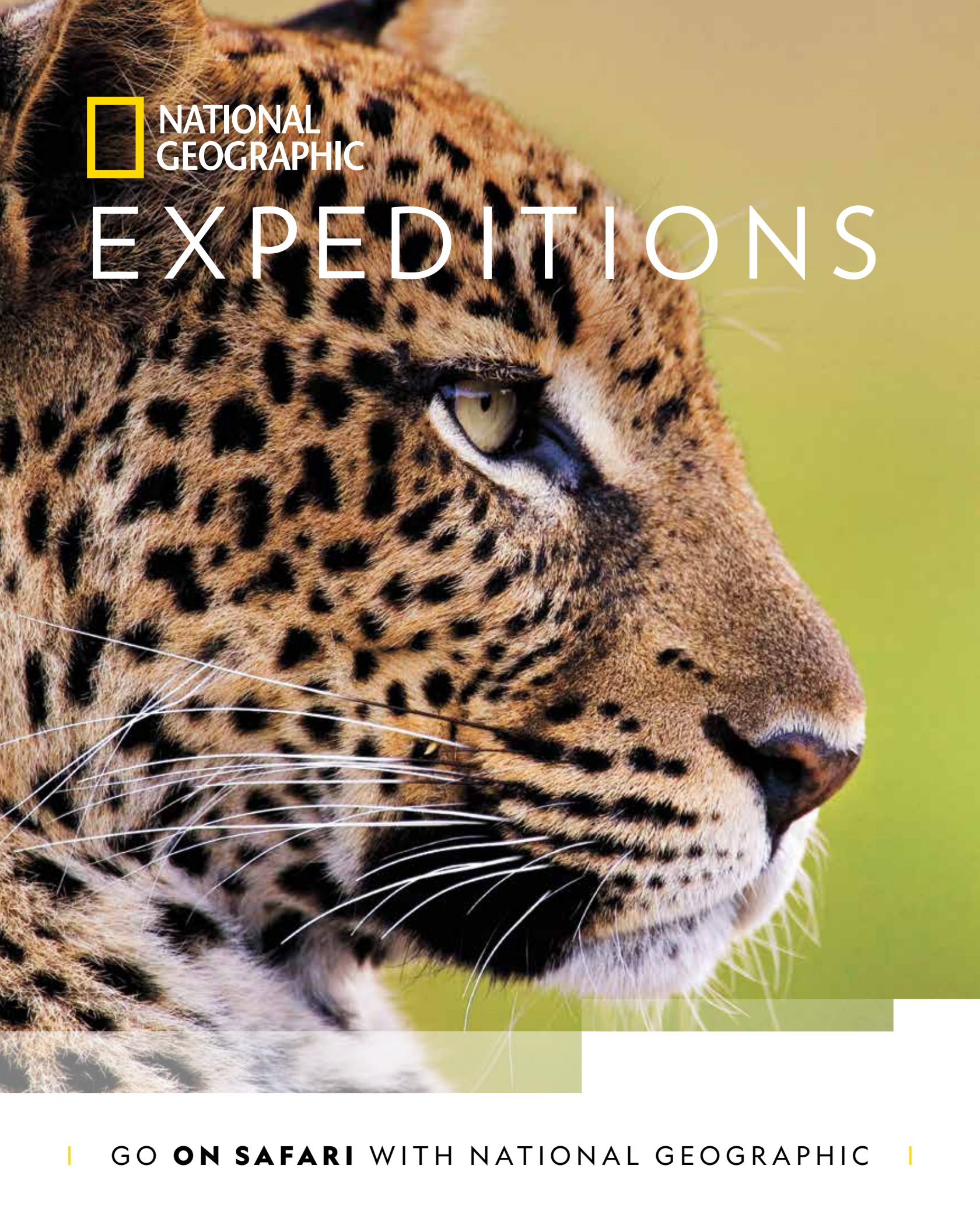

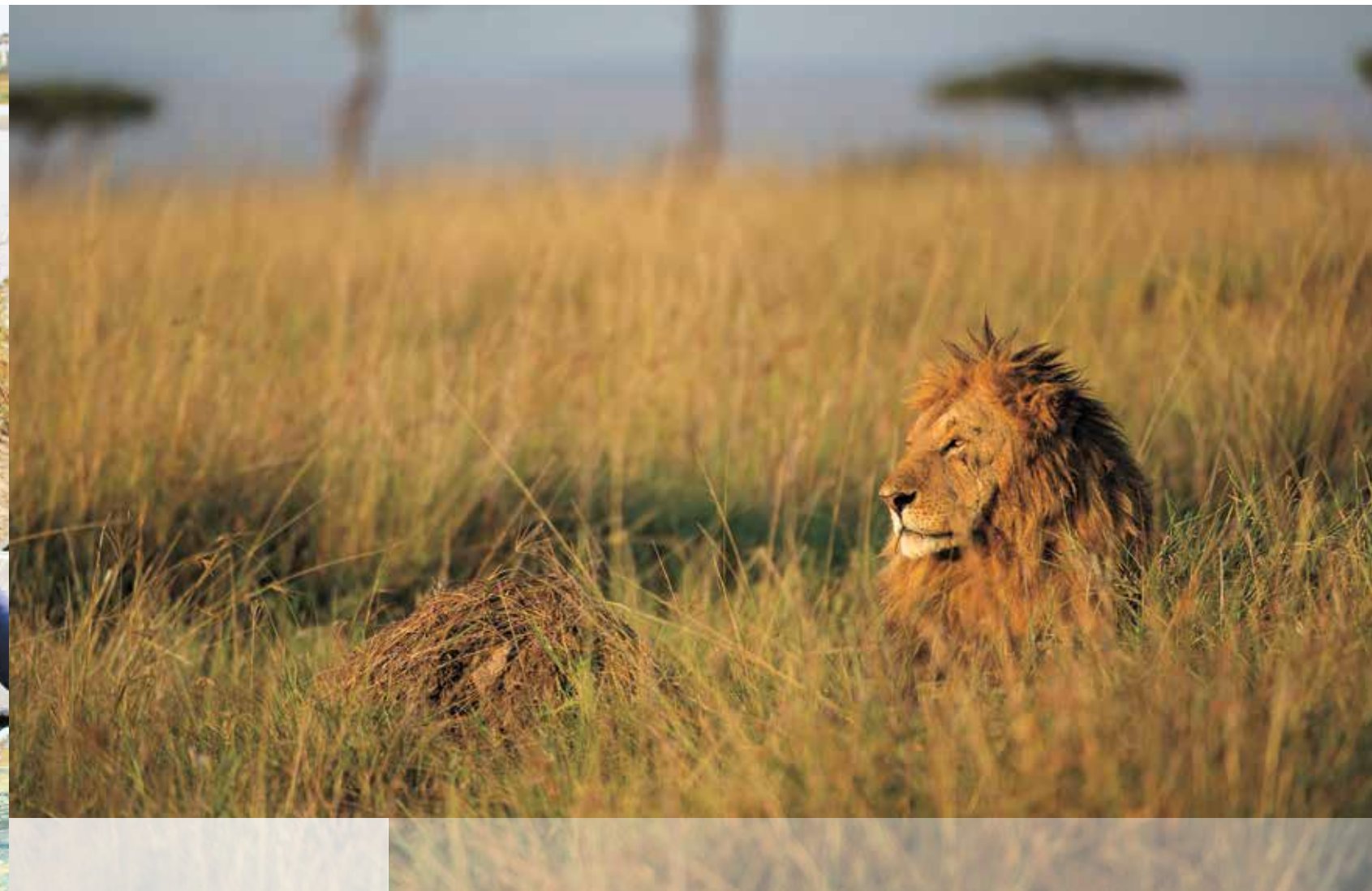

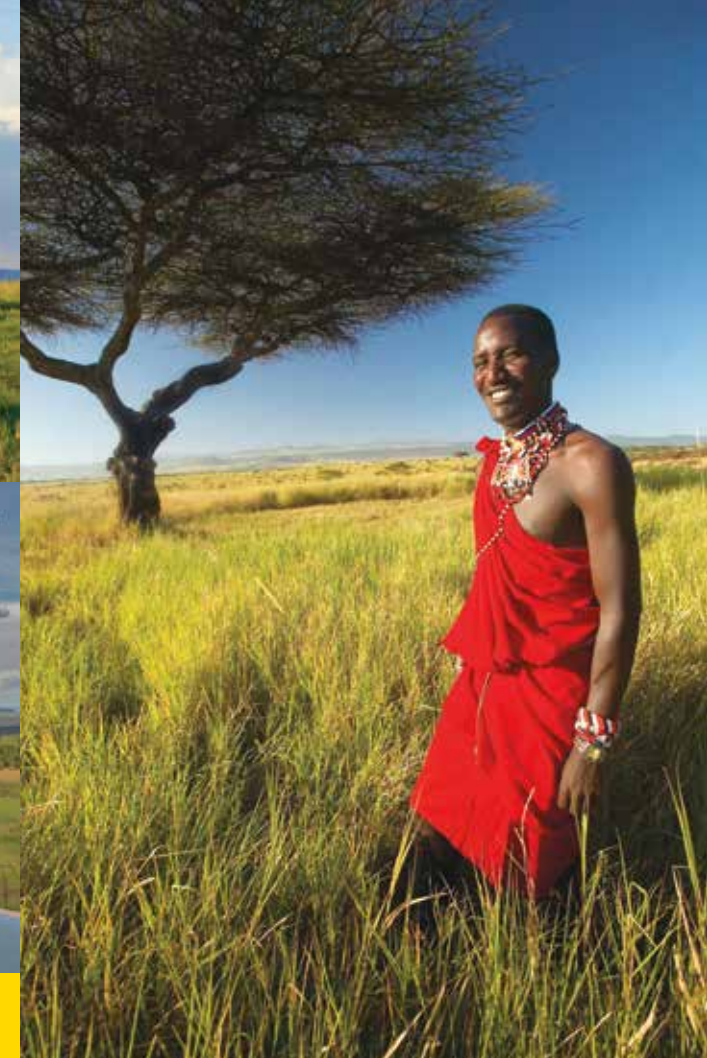

ITINERARY | 9 DAYS



DAY 1 | ARUSHA, TANZANIA

Arrive at Kilimanjaro International Airport this evening and transfer to our hotel. **Arusha Coffee Lodge**

DAYS 2 AND 3 | LAKE MANYARA NATIONAL PARK

Drive to Lake Manyara National Park and set out on our first safari to discover legendary wildlife amid the stunning Rift Valley landscape. The next morning, enjoy a guided walk around the lodge's leafy grounds before hiking to a coffee plantation.

Plantation Lodge | Meals: B/L/D Daily

DAYS 4 AND 5 | NGORONGORO CRATER

Travel to the Ngorongoro Highlands and meet with Maasai community members, learning about this fascinating culture firsthand. Descend to the floor of the Ngorongoro Crater, spotting colorful birdlife and tracking elephants, rare black rhinos, and

cheetahs. On our second day, set off on a morning safari before an afternoon at leisure. Later, National Geographic Explorer at Large Louise Leakey or Dr. Fidelis Masao, co-director of the Olduvai Landscape Paleoarchaeology Project, joins us to discuss the groundbreaking paleontological finds in the region.

DAY 6 | OLDUVAI GORGE/ SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK

Drive to Olduvai Gorge, where, on a National Geographic-sponsored expedition in 1960, Louis and Mary Leakey discovered *Homo habilis*, one of the earlier members of the human genus. This morning, Louise (the Leakeys' granddaughter) or Dr. Masao will discuss the family's legacy and ongoing work at Olduvai Gorge. Take a private tour of the site or accompany Dr. Masao on a walk. This

afternoon, drive to our lodge in the southern Serengeti, looking for lions, giraffes, and leopards along the way.

DAYS 7 AND 8 | SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK

Rise early for an optional hot-air balloon safari or a game drive before flying to the northern Serengeti. With luck, we will witness the river crossings of the wildebeest migration. Great herds of wildebeests and zebras eye predators as crocodile snouts break the surface of the Mara River. Stay at Sayari Camp, a National Geographic Unique Lodge, and take in the spectacular array of wildlife on game drives. On our last evening, gather for a candlelit farewell dinner.

DAY 9 | SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK/ARUSHA

After a morning safari, fly to Arusha. Relax at our hotel before connecting with your flight home.

ITINERARY | 10 DAYS



DAY 1 | JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA/ SABI SABI GAME RESERVE

Arrive in Johannesburg and fly to Sabi Sabi Game Reserve, a private reserve located in greater Kruger National Park. Settle into Sabi Sabi Bush Lodge—a National Geographic Unique Lodge of the World—and enjoy a game drive before our welcome dinner tonight. **Sabi Sabi Bush Lodge | Meals: D**

DAY 2 | SABI SABI PRIVATE GAME RESERVE

Set off on an early-morning safari to observe wildlife at one of its most active times, then relax before lunch. During an afternoon game drive, sip sundowners in the bush. Continue exploring, searching for nocturnal predators before gathering for dinner in a reed-enclosed *boma*. **Sabi Sabi Bush Lodge | Meals: B/L/D**

DAYS 3, 4, AND 5 | MASHATU GAME RESERVE, BOTSWANA

Fly to Mashatu Game Reserve, a private reserve in Botswana. Take morning and evening game drives, and choose two of the following activities: go on a bush walk, join a photographer in a hide to capture close-ups of wildlife (select departures), take a safari drive, or mountain bike along elephant trails. Later, visit the Motloutse Ruins with archaeologist Grant Hall. **Mashatu Lodge | Meals: B/L/D Daily**

DAYS 6 AND 7 | MOREMI GAME RESERVE, OKAVANGO DELTA

Soar over the Okavango Delta to the Moremi Game Reserve. Explore by open safari vehicle, and take a trip to Gadikwe Island by flat-bottom boat to see hippos and breeding colonies of herons, egrets, pelicans, and more. **Camp Xakanaxa | Meals: B/L/D Daily**

DAYS 8 AND 9 | CHOBE NATIONAL PARK/ LIVINGSTONE, ZAMBIA

Fly to Chobe National Park and embark on a river cruise, watching for elephants at the water's edge. Continue to Livingstone, the gateway to Victoria Falls. Choose to visit a local village or the Livingstone Museum, or head into the Maramba market. Take a canoe safari, or experience Victoria Falls on an optional flight-seeing excursion. Later, explore the falls along suspended walkways with a local guide. On our final evening, enjoy a sunset cruise along the Zambezi River, followed by a farewell dinner at our hotel. **Royal Livingstone Hotel | Meals: Day 8: B/L; Day 9: B/D**

DAY 10 | JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA

Fly to Johannesburg and connect with your return flight home. **Meals: B**

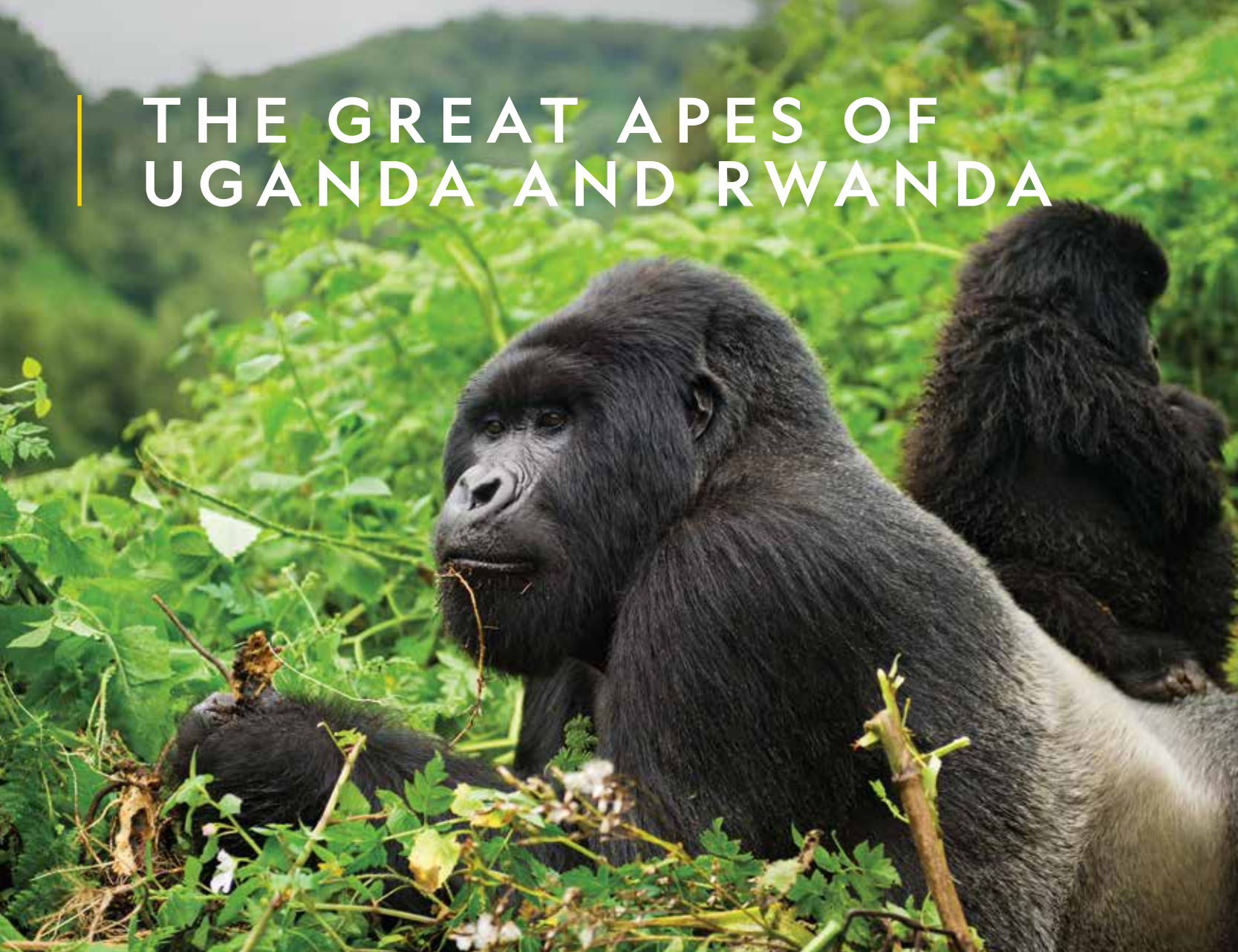

THE GREAT APES OF UGANDA AND RWANDA



THE NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC DIFFERENCE

- Join a National Geographic-funded primatologist on treks in search of chimpanzees, gorillas, and endangered golden monkeys.
- Watch the antics of chimpanzees up close at a sanctuary established in association with the Jane Goodall Institute.
- Meet with scientists at the Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund's Karisoke Research Center to learn about ongoing conservation projects.

ITINERARY | 11 DAYS



DAYS 1 AND 2 | ENTEBBE, UGANDA/ NGAMBA ISLAND

Arrive in Entebbe this evening and transfer to our hotel. The next day, visit the Chimpanzee Sanctuary on Ngamba Island, established in association with the Jane Goodall Institute as a habitat for rescued and orphaned chimpanzees. Later, explore the Uganda Wildlife Education Centre.

Lake Victoria Serena Resort | Meals: Day 2: B/L/D

DAYS 3 AND 4 | KIBALE NATIONAL PARK

Travel to Kibale National Park and check in to our lodge. Meet with a local researcher and search for chimpanzees; black-and-white colobus, red-tailed, and blue monkeys; and the rare L'Hoest's monkey. Explore the Bigodi Wetland Sanctuary.

Kyaninga Lodge | Meals: B/L/D Daily

DAYS 5 AND 6 | KIBALE NATIONAL PARK/ QUEEN ELIZABETH NATIONAL PARK

Spend a second morning tracking chimpanzees. Continue to Queen Elizabeth National Park, and go on safari to look for elephants, lions, and Ugandan kobs before an afternoon wildlife cruise.

Kyambura Gorge Lodge | Meals: B/L/D Daily

DAYS 7 AND 8 | BWINDI IMPENETRABLE NATIONAL PARK

Journey to Bwindi Impenetrable National Park, home to roughly half the world's remaining mountain gorillas. Head into the forest to sit among these gentle giants, observing one of the planet's most endangered creatures up close.

Bwindi Lodge | Meals: B/L/D Daily

DAYS 9 AND 10 | VOLCANOES NATIONAL PARK, RWANDA

Cross into Rwanda and settle into your private villa overlooking volcanoes and lakes. Meet experts at the Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund's International's Karisoke Research Center to learn about ongoing conservation efforts. Spend the next day tracking mountain gorillas in Volcanoes National Park, where National Geographic grantee Dian Fossey conducted research on gorillas for 18 years. Enjoy a traditional dance performance this evening.

DAY 11 | VOLCANOES NATIONAL PARK/KIGALI

This morning, search for endangered golden monkeys in the park. After lunch, transfer to the airport for your flight home. **Meals: B/L**

THE NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC DIFFERENCE

- On a trip inspired by National Geographic-sponsored efforts to save Kenya's iconic wildlife, meet grantees working throughout the country to protect elephants, rhinos, and big cats.
- Set out on safari in three wildlife conservancies: Amboseli National Park, Lewa Wildlife Conservancy, and Masai Mara National Reserve.
- In Nairobi, interact with orphaned elephants at the renowned David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust.

ITINERARY | 10 DAYS



DAY 1 | NAIROBI, KENYA

Arrive at the airport in Nairobi, where our staff will facilitate your transfer to the hotel. Enjoy the rest of the day at leisure. **Tamarind Tree Hotel**

DAYS 2 AND 3 | AMBOSELI NATIONAL PARK

Fly to Amboseli National Park and continue to our safari lodge, set within view of Mount Kilimanjaro. Set out on safari into the park in search of cheetahs, lions, zebras, and other creatures. Spend an afternoon at the Amboseli Elephant Research Project, whose director, Cynthia Moss, has received support from the National Geographic Society for her work. **Tortilis Camp | Meals: B/L/D Daily**

DAYS 4, 5, AND 6 | LEWA WILDLIFE CONSERVANCY

Fly to Lewa Wildlife Conservancy, considered a

model in the conservation field and home to roughly 15 percent of Kenya's entire rhino population. Set out on daily safaris and enjoy a birding excursion or a bush walk. Spend an afternoon traversing the hanging bridges of Ngare Ndare Forest Reserve, or delve into Samburu culture during a village visit.

Lewa Safari Camp | Meals: B/L/D Daily

DAY 7 | LEWA WILDLIFE CONSERVANCY/MASAI MARA

Take a final safari through Lewa, then fly to Masai Mara National Reserve and settle into our stunning safari camp. After lunch, enjoy an open-vehicle wildlife drive. **andBeyond Kichwa Tembo Tented Camp | Meals: B/L/D**

DAYS 8 AND 9 | MASAI MARA

Head out on morning and evening safaris to view wildlife when it's most active. Meet with researchers

from the Anne K. Taylor Fund, an organization that works to conserve wildlife with support from National Geographic's Big Cats Initiative. Later, enjoy a final safari followed by a farewell dinner. **andBeyond Kichwa Tembo Tented Camp Meals: B/L/D Daily**

DAY 10 | NAIROBI

Return to Nairobi to meet National Geographic grantee Washington Wachira and learn about his Youth Conservation Awareness Programme. Visit the Giraffe Centre, where the endangered Rothschild's giraffe is bred in captivity before being released into the wild. Continue to the David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust, featured in the September 2011 issue of *National Geographic* magazine, and get up close to orphaned elephants during their afternoon feeding. Transfer to the airport for your flight home. **Meals: B/L**

YOUR NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC EXPERT



Wildlife biologist, conservationist, and National Geographic grantee **Washington Wachira** will join the July, September, and October departures. Washington has received funding from National Geographic for his research on the species ecology of the African crowned eagle—work aimed at improving forest management in and around Nairobi. MADAGASCAR WILDLIFE EXPEDITION



THE NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC DIFFERENCE

- Visit the field station of primatologist and National Geographic grantee Patricia Wright, one of the world's foremost experts on lemurs.
- Encounter endemic species with a wildlife biologist, including the wailing indri lemur, the dancing sifaka, and tiny chameleons.
- Explore the iconic baobab trees of Tsimanampetsotsa National Park, where National Geographic has funded research on an extinct gorilla-sized lemur species.

ITINERARY | 13 DAYS



DAYS 1, 2, AND 3 | ANTANANARIVO, MADAGASCAR/ ANDASIBE-MANTADIA NATIONAL PARK

Arrive in Antananarivo and transfer to the Vakona private park, where we'll look for orchids, lemurs, and birds amid the lush lianas and ferns. Spend a day hiking in Andasibe-Mantadia National Park. Keep your eye out for some of the 14 lemur species that live here; and enjoy a guided night stroll, spotting brightly colored chameleons, frogs, and lizards.

DAYS 4-7 | ANALAMAZAOTRA/ RANOMAFANA NATIONAL PARK

In Analamazaotra Reserve, track the indri, the largest lemur species. Then spend two full days exploring Ranomafana National Park. In 1986, National

Geographic grantee and primatologist Patricia Wright discovered a new lemur species here—the golden bamboo lemur. On hikes, look for more than ten species of lemurs, as well as tenrecs and mongooses. Visit the Centre ValBio, founded by Pat, and hear about the latest studies that she and her team are conducting. **Plumeria Hotel;**

Hotel Thermal Ranomafana | Meals: B/L/D Daily

DAYS 8 AND 9 | ISALO NATIONAL PARK

Head west toward Isalo National Park, stopping en route at paper-making and weaving workshops. Spend the next day hiking Isalo's dramatic landscape of sandstone canyons and unusual rock formations dotted with gem-colored natural pools, and catch the sunset at the sandstone "window of Isalo." **Isalo Rock Lodge | Meals: B/L/D Daily**

DAYS 10 AND 11 | TOLIARA/ANAKAO/ TSIMANAMPETSOTSA NATIONAL PARK

Travel to the coastal town of Toliara and board a boat bound for our oceanfront lodge in Anakao. Take a day to explore Tsimanampetsotsa National Park, where National Geographic has funded research on giant lemurs. Wander among Dr. Seuss-like baobab trees; explore the grottos where blind fish swim; and spot some of the park's 100-plus bird species, including greater and dwarf flamingos and the Madagascar plover. **Anakao Ocean Lodge and Spa**

DAYS 12 AND 13 | TOLIARA/ANTANANARIVO

Fly from Toliara to Antananarivo. The next day, visit the Royal Hill of Ambohimanga—a UNESCO World Heritage site. Later, transfer to the airport for your flight home. **Relais des Plateaux**

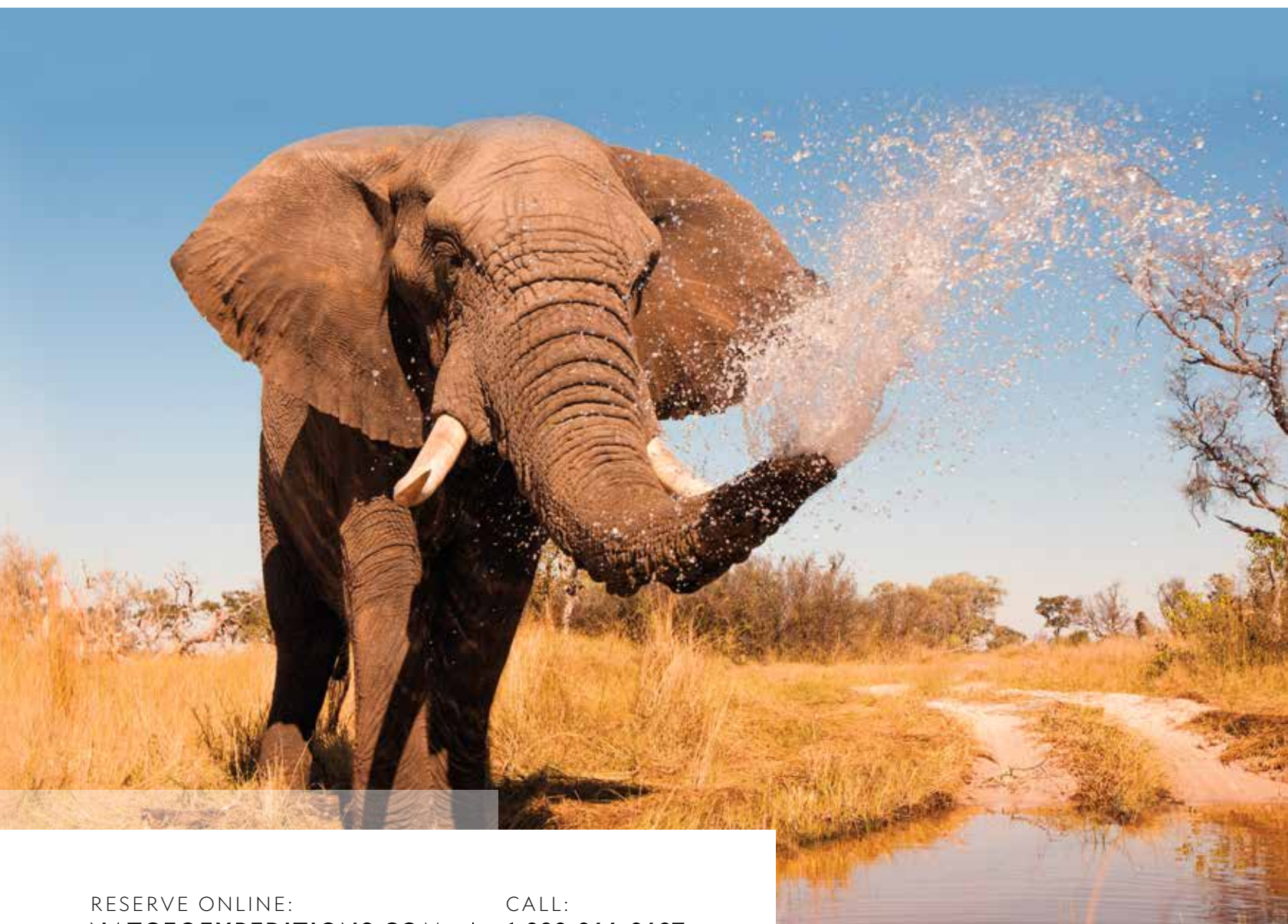
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
